is the largest philanthropic organization in Delaware County. We are one of 780 community foundations around the country. Community foundations bring individuals, families, and businesses together to pool their dollars to address the needs of their communities.

We believe in the exponential power of collective service, action, and giving. The role of the Foundation is to shine a light on the big issues facing the county and coordinate the philanthropic efforts to address them. We are committed to bringing all of Delaware County together to look for solutions and to tackle our major social challenges.

We envision a healthy and equitable Delaware County where every person has the opportunity to have an excellent quality of life — a future where our collective impact ripples through generations.

ENGAGING THE COMMUNITY

We're committed to engaging the generous residents and funders in Delaware County, helping them to be informed philanthropists and change-makers.

We foster collaborations among funders, government officials, and nonprofit leaders to create a vibrant, interconnected philanthropic network. Over the past year, we've hosted events to connect regional and local funders, community leaders, and elected officials to the work happening in our local communities. This included a neighborhood tour of Upper Darby and a behind-the-scenes visit to the Foundation's public health and housing programs.

In partnership with community leaders, government officials, and housing experts, we established a new rental housing coalition to break down the barriers of access for households with low-moderate incomes and increase affordable access for everyone.

ADDRESSING OUR COMMUNITY'S BASIC NEEDS

Through our public health and housing programs, we provide direct services to thousands of families each year. The programs allow us to both offer essential services and gain a true understanding of community needs. The programs work in coordination to address the high and disparate rates of infant and maternal mortality in the county.





Our in-house direct services alone cannot fully meet the vast spectrum of community needs. We know that a well-resourced and effective nonprofit sector is critical to addressing basic needs and reducing inequalities. We support nonprofits' important work through two primary mechanisms: strategic grant funding and the Center for Nonprofit Excellence (CNEEx).

Through our grantmaking, the Foundation provides funding for both established programs that have demonstrated their effectiveness, and innovative

initiatives that show promise in addressing community needs. Through the CNEEx, we provide training, resources, and support to enhance the operational capacity of nonprofits.

FUNDING IS CRITICAL

The Foundation receives funding from many donors—large and small. We are supported by federal, state, and local governments, along with corporate partners, foundations, and individual donors, who help to fund our programs, convenings, and overall mission. Together, these combined resources give us the means to find innovative solutions for our community.

Progress in our community is made by large-scale collaborations and by individuals who want to see change in their neighborhoods. These generous donors establish funds with the Foundation to address the issues we face as a community and to fulfill their own philanthropic interests. Last year, the Foundation distributed \$2.6 million in grants, scholarships, and charitable care support to more than one hundred vital nonprofit and community groups that provide critical services and resources for our neighbors.

WHY WE'RE NEEDED

INEQUITY IN DELAWARE COUNTY

DELAWARE COUNTY IS A THRIVING LANDSCAPE

of prosperity that outshines the national average for many quality-of-life indicators. However, underlying those promising numbers lies a complex narrative of extreme disparity.

While certain segments of the population are enjoying long, prosperous lives, this experience is far from universal. Pockets of poverty throughout the county have led to concentrated inequalities in various aspects of life, such as income, education, health, life expectancy, and access to opportunities.

It is expected that the existing gaps in Delaware County have grown since the publication of this report. The expiration of pandemic-era relief programs combined with the effects of inflation means that many more families are struggling to make ends meet. We have seen a sharp upturn in demand at food pantries, poorer birth outcomes among Black and Hispanic mothers, and a dire housing crisis.

An individual who works a minimum wage job would need to work the equivalent of

3.4

full-time jobs to afford a two-bedroom unit at fair market rent.

Nationwide, incomes have not kept up with rent increases, and Delaware County is no different. 15% of households in the county spend more than 50% of their income on housing. This is considered “extremely cost burdened” and tends to affect very low-income, disproportionately Black renters.

ENSURING THE STRENGTH AND LONGEVITY OF DELAWARE COUNTY NONPROFITS

Nonprofit services include nonprofit endowment funds, fiscal management, grant funding, and nonprofit capacity building through the Center for Nonprofit Excellence.

THE FOUNDATION PROVIDES GRANT FUNDING to Delaware County nonprofits addressing critical needs using a racial equity lens in the areas of children’s health and well-being, economic development, housing, and food security. Our goal is to reduce disparities and promote equity for communities that have experienced historic disinvestment. In our fiscal year ending in June 2023, we awarded 51 new Impact Grants totaling \$1.64 million, \$183K to eight nonprofits receiving second-year Impact Grants, and \$371K for ten nonprofits receiving third-year Impact Grants. These grants are made possible thanks to a permanent charitable endowment and generous donor contributions. In addition, the Foundation

distributed \$781K through restricted funds and charitable care support.

Complementing funding support, we provide a variety of tools and resources available for nonprofit organizations. The Foundation’s **Center for Nonprofit Excellence**, launched in 2019, engages more than 100 leaders each year in monthly events and professional development opportunities. Through our **Nonprofit Management Services**, we offer fiscal sponsorship and back-office accounting support for organizations with limited resources. We administer **Nonprofit Funds** such as endowments, reserve funds, and planned giving programs that help Delaware County’s critical nonprofits secure a solid financial future.

Through grantmaking and services for nonprofits, we advance crucial work happening in every corner of the county.

It’s extremely important to make sure families are able to visit their babies: it supports the bonding process, the mental health of parents, and the health outcomes of the babies.”

MURPHY'S GIVING MARKET

A neighbor-to-neighbor solution to address growing food insecurity in Upper Darby.

"I've been helping start food pantries for 17 years now. The first one was out of the trunk of my car at church. I'm a school teacher and special needs coordinator, and I see how it affects students when they don't have their basic needs met.

When the pandemic hit, most food pantries shut down because they were staffed by seniors, who were the most vulnerable to COVID. I started helping by bringing food to my own backyard and coordinating with the pantries to pick it up. People who saw the boxes would stop by and ask about the food, so we decided to keep some on hand for neighbors. Then a woman asked if she could tell her sister about it, and next thing we knew, there were 75 people lined up down the street. We made it a weekly distribution with different stations. Libraries were closed, so we had books. Clothing stores were closed, so we had clothes, Christmas stuff, and sneakers. We partnered with health insurance companies to sign people up for COVID testing and vaccines.

Philabundance reached out and asked how they could help. I said, I need to turn this from literal grassroots — my yard, with no grass left — into a building. They said, if you find a building, we'll help you pay rent. We moved in July 2021 and now serve over 250 people a week. We continue to partner with Philabundance and Share Food Program to source food.

Things have changed over the past few years. People who were once middle class are now struggling. Everyone comes through. Every ethnic background, every language, every age range. It's so important we have volunteers who represent everyone. Food that is culturally relevant. We try to make sure this is a place of peace, where people are friendly and treated as friends."

Recognizing that many barriers exist for families to access high-quality healthcare, the Foundation has developed alternate systems of care as a complement to clinical healthcare services. These services are rooted in culturally relevant practices and focus on building deep relationships with clients.

Our wrap-around services build a strong “village” of support from pregnancy to labor and delivery and throughout a child’s first years.

Healthy Start case managers partner with expecting parents to support healthy pregnancies, breastfeeding, and infant care, as well as provide home-visiting support and parenting education. The Foundation is one of 101 Healthy Start sites nationwide implementing community-based solutions to address social and environmental determinants impacting maternal, paternal, and infant health and well-being.

Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) is considered one of the gold standards of evidence-based programming, pairing a nurse with a family during pregnancy and through the first two years of their child’s life. NFP’s holistic, relationship-based approach supports pregnant women while also helping to address challenges such as healthcare access, stable housing, and navigating systems to address food insecurity or childcare issues during the crucial early childhood period.

Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) closely works with both Healthy Start and NFP, focusing on healthy nutrition for people who are pregnant, lactating women, and young children. Families enrolled in WIC have access to a range of services, including nutritional counseling, breastfeeding support, access to healthy foods, and health screenings.





BY REDUCING TOXIC STRESSORS AND INCREASING PROTECTIVE FACTORS AT BIRTH, OUR PROGRAMS PROVIDE LIFE-LONG BENEFITS FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES.

Our impact extends beyond healthcare. **Housing Opportunities Program for Equity (HOPE)** ensures clients have a safe place to call home. **Medical Legal Partnership** provides free legal services to clients with unmet civil legal needs. Through our **Fatherhood Program**, we raise awareness about the importance of partner engagement during the perinatal period. **Moving Beyond Depression** provides in-home counseling services for participants experiencing depression and anxiety.

Our **doula services team** advocates on the pregnant person's behalf with their medical team, joins families for labor and delivery at the hospital, and provides visits before and after birth.

WHAT'S NEXT?

We're exploring new clinical-community partnerships to enhance care for pregnant people, to address the lack of birthing facilities in Upper Darby and the barriers to access faced by many families in the county.

Client Profile

“Rosa” and her three children live in an apartment in Yeadon. She lost her job when she was pregnant with her twins, and she had a history of past evictions. When she received her tax refund, she was able to catch up on rent payments, but fell behind again when the money ran out. HOPE connected Rosa with Medical-Legal Partnership attorneys to advocate for her with the landlord. Rosa found a new job at the end of June. HOPE staff are now working with her to plan a budget based on her current income and assisting her in finding stable, long-term housing.

ENTERING ITS THIRD YEAR, THE FOUNDATION’S **Housing Opportunities Program for Equity (HOPE)** offers a holistic approach to permanent housing. We recognize that stable housing is the foundation for family and community well-being, directly impacting health outcomes, educational opportunities, and neighborhood economic development. HOPE intertwines policy advocacy, case management, housing placement, financial literacy, referral services, and direct financial relief to ensure Delaware County residents can maintain safe and affordable housing.

HOPE receives referrals from and connects clients with other vital services, including **WIC, Medical-Legal Partnership**, and our maternal health programs. We’re advocating for Delaware County residents through the Affordable Housing Coalition and our new Rental Housing Coalition, which convenes partners to collectively address issues facing tenants. And we recently launched the Utility Stabilization Program to help county residents enroll in PECO’s Customer Assistance Program and educate clients about predatory third-party suppliers.

Addressing the root causes of housing insecurity creates a society where everyone has opportunities to thrive.

“As a local organization, the Foundation is in tune with needs as they arise. I have seen firsthand how they respond to unforeseen challenges in the community and rally other funders to collectively address social and health issues.

I started a designated fund with the Foundation because I wanted to continue to support organizations that my wife Shelly and I had given to for years. Establishing the fund was easy, it simplified our giving process, and there were significant tax advantages.

Our fund at the Foundation is simple to maintain and requires minimal work on my end. I never considered myself a philanthropist before working with the Foundation. I believe this is a great option for people in the middle — it is easy to get involved.

Most financial institutions require a higher minimum to start a fund. The Foundation offers a reasonable starting point to establish a fund, charges low fees, and the fees you pay the Foundation actually return to your local community. The fund is part of the Foundation’s corpus so it can maximize financial returns, providing even more grant dollars. I find community foundations more transparent in their operations and more impactful with their money.

As a Foundation board member and member of its Grantmaking Committee, I have really gotten to know the organization, and the many nonprofits right in my backyard, learning about organizations that I wasn’t aware of before. The Foundation is a great clearing house for vetting nonprofits.

I want to be much more involved in philanthropy in the future, and I want to encourage my kids to set up their own fund.”



FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

As of June 30, 2023, the Foundation's consolidated assets totaled more than \$74M. The annual rate of return on investments is expected to be commensurate with the prevailing investment environment. The 2023 fiscal year saw a recovery of the markets from the previous year. As a result, the portfolio yielded an 8.58 percent return this year.

GROWTH

The following charts compare the total assets and contributions of the past six fiscal years for the Foundation for the fiscal year ending June 30. Since 2018, the portfolio has returned 7.33 percent, outperforming the blended benchmark.
