We write to you with tremendous optimism for the future of philanthropy in Delaware County, following a year of significant challenges for both the Foundation and our community. When Prospect Medical Holdings' bankruptcy resulted in the loss of our major health system, the Foundation stepped up to provide a critical \$20 million lifeline. We are heartbroken by the hospital closures and the devastating impact on our county.

That lifeline, along with other liabilities associated with the bankruptcy, has diminished the Foundation's asset base. Nevertheless, thanks to you, we have continued to grow our public health programs and expanded our role as a champion for Delaware County's nonprofits.

The Foundation remains financially strong and deeply committed to serving Delaware County. That is why we have approached the transition to new leadership with intentionality, implementing a clear succession plan for board leadership from Cyrise Dixon as Chair to Michael Magnavita, and planning for the retirement of our first President, Frances Sheehan.

The board completed a successful search with the hiring of experienced local philanthropy and nonprofit leader Michael Kellerman, who began as President on October 1. The Foundation is moving forward with vision, energy, and a deep commitment to serve our nonprofits.

The nonprofit sector is navigating a period of tremendous uncertainty and instability. Communities throughout our county are struggling to adjust to reduced access to health services. Now more than ever, we all need this strong Foundation.

We hope that the stories in this report clearly demonstrate how we are here for good, standing with our neighbors and partners, guided by our belief that together we can build a stronger, healthier Delaware County. We never take your engagement and support for granted. We are grateful to each one of you who has shared your time, skills, and resources – you are part of the Foundation's story.

Together with the Board of Directors and staff, we commit to all of you that we will continue to advocate for residents, provide trusted philanthropic stewardship, and create opportunities for our diverse communities to thrive.

As we look ahead, we know that the future is bright, and with your continued generosity and support, there is no limit to what we can accomplish together.

Delaware County, the instability unfolding within our society and around the world, and the obstacles faced by the Foundation, we feel renewed commitment to this county we call home.


A Local Foundation with Deep Roots

In the face of an unsteady and rapidly changing landscape, we have seen first-hand how countywide collaboration strengthens our communities. Our second annual Delco Gives raised \$2.3 million from 11,700 donors to support 306 organizations across the county — a 32% increase over last year.

This collective approach to fundraising expands what's possible for our county's nonprofit sector: it builds strong connections, inspires community action, and creates lasting impact here at home.

NONPROFIT SERVICES

Nonprofits drive Delco forward. Whether they are addressing emergency issues or creating meaningful cultural experiences, our county's nonprofit organizations directly improve the quality of life for individuals, families, and communities. Each year, the Foundation fuels the work of hundreds of organizations and their leaders through trust-based philanthropy and a network of support.

Advancing Nonprofit Success

The Center for Nonprofit Excellence (CNEx) supports nonprofit leaders with individualized, cohort-based, and certificate-based professional learning opportunities across four key areas: Nonprofit Operations and Accounting, Leadership and Governance, Fundraising and Stewardship, and Evaluation and Impact, while advancing racial equity throughout all programs and partnerships.

Investing in the Future with Endowment Funds

The Foundation helps nonprofits plan for long-term sustainability and ensure they have the necessary resources to weather changing circumstances. We help organizations to establish endowment funds and planned giving programs, providing investment management services and technical support.

"Media Fellowship House has been a small but mighty force advancing civil rights in Delco since 1944, advocating for communities historically excluded from home ownership. We believe safe and affordable housing is a cornerstone of racial equity and a pathway to generational wealth. It's a civil right, and it's what every family deserves.

Fueling Essential Services

Through competitive Impact Grants, as well as grant disbursements from restricted charitable funds, the Foundation has granted funding directly to the organizations providing essential services in our communities since 2018.

In fiscal year 2025, the Foundation awarded new Impact Grants to 47 nonprofits serving Delaware County, and third-year grant payments to seven grantee partners. In total, the Foundation distributed more than \$22.1 million through Impact Grants, restricted funds,

and charitable care support (including \$20M for Crozer Health).

Earlier this year, the Foundation shared the difficult news that we will pause our Impact Grant funding for nonprofits as we adapt to shifts in the Foundation's financial resources related to the closure of Crozer Health. We remain committed to supporting Delaware County nonprofits through staff and board training, donor education about the value of the county's nonprofit sector, and by hosting Delco Gives again in May 2026.

SHARE FOOD PROGRAM:

Fighting hunger in the Greater Philadelphia region "Share manages the programming for food pantries in Delaware County and provides school lunch food for more than 300,000 kids across Greater Philadelphia, every day. Regionally, some of the sharpest spikes in poverty and food insecurity are happening in Delaware County, so opening a new warehouse and implementing a hyperlocal response here has been a priority.

"As food banks and safety net programs grapple with historic federal funding cuts, we are more reliant than ever on community support. Having that village behind us in times of great uncertainty is essential and allows us to focus on innovative, efficient responses to hunger. We're thinking about the wrap-around support needed to lift folks out of food insecurity: mutual aid, community-based programs, workshops for people to know their rights. We're doing a lot more work than just providing a box of food."

FAMILY SUPPORT LINE:

Providing a continuum of services to prevent and treat childhood sexual abuse



"We've been providing wrap-around supports for children and families affected by sexual abuse for 36 years. As more people have become aware of our work, requests for our services are at an all-time high. Right now, we have a waiting list for mental health services, and we can only see about 41% of the kids who need them.

"Everything we do is rooted in prevention. Every step helps a child recover and move on to have a healthy life in the future. We can see that our prevention efforts are working: children know right away who to tell when something inappropriate happens, and we can intervene before it escalates. Child sexual abuse is generational, so we work with the whole family to stop the patterns.

"Over the past year, with changes in government funding, it's been harder to find stable, sustainable funding. We need to serve more people with fewer resources, so we've been diligently working to diversify our funding sources. We were **able to achieve our goals this year** with the Foundation's help, both through their Impact Grant and connections to other funders. Their partnership allows us to deliver our mission daily."

ANEWAY:

Creating meaningful jobs, purpose, and community for individuals with disabilities

"In some ways, we were creating a place where my son could work and learn life skills after he finished high school. But we really wanted to create something to connect the broader community. We wanted to flip the script on employment by **creating businesses specifically for people with disabilities**. We design jobs based on what people can do, not what they can't.

"We started with an arcade and candy store that employs people with disabilities in an integrated environment. As soon as we launched, we had so many people reaching out. We needed to create more jobs. So we began another business making customized apparel, followed by customized candy gifts.

"Our newest venture is a coffee cart at the county courthouse in Media — the idea came from high school programs where students serve coffee to teachers. For many young people, it's their favorite part of the week. So why not make drinks and snacks available to jurors while they're waiting? It's a low-cost entry, integrated with the public, and it builds on skills our employees have already developed.

"Recently, a business that's opening on State Street came to me and said, 'We want to do something similar, can you help us?' So I worked with them to identify how they could utilize employees with disabilities in their space. They ended up hiring four of our employees. The moment I brought over my employees with their applications, I thought, 'what I'm doing is working.' We're helping people gain confidence and skills, and we're spreading a new employment model."

TEACHERS' TEAMMATES:

Equipping K-12 students and teachers with the tools they need to succeed in the classroom "We know first-hand that teachers too often reach into their own wallets to fill basic classroom needs. Teachers' Teammates connects teachers with free supplies to help close that resource gap. In the past year, we moved more than \$1 million worth of new or gently used supplies into local classrooms. Every dollar and donation helps us remove barriers for teachers, repurpose unused materials, and support thousands of students who deserve a fair chance at success.

"Thanks to the Foundation's trust-based philanthropy, we've been able to grow strategically and responsively— whether launching emergency initiatives like 'School at Home Bags' during the pandemic, or scaling delivery services to schools to make access easier for educators. Their investment in leadership development and unrestricted funding means we're not just sustaining operations, we're building lasting capacity."




DONOR SERVICES



"Our community-based public health programs have a long history of standing in the gap. We're always identifying areas where no one else is meeting the need, or where meeting the need is so delayed that it can be life-threatening. Right now, we're living in challenging times. INTRODUCING FAMILY VILLAGE

Helping Delaware County Families Thrive

For more than 20 years, Delaware County relied on three interconnected maternal health programs run by the Crozer Keystone Health System. When the system was sold ten years ago, the Foundation took the programs on, investing in their growth, expansion and effectiveness, and ensuring that new and expecting mothers and families with young children would benefit from a holistic approach.

Our interconnected programs deliver supportive services, health education, food access, housing support, civil legal aid, and mental health services — provided by trained professionals dedicated to removing the barriers to well-being.

We're one of a small handful of community foundations across the country that provide direct services in this way. As our programs have expanded, we have recognized that they deserve their own identity within the community. To that end, we have given these services a new name. We are proud to introduce Family Village: Helping Delaware County Families Thrive.

The services haven't changed. Family Village provides the **same continuum of care**, designed to protect families from the negative impacts of poverty and challenges of life, and support well-being. It takes a village to raise a child, and Family Village offers a **nurturing community for thousands of Delaware County families** each year. The Foundation for Delaware County continues to provide an efficient, robust financial back office to ensure that the Family Village team can focus on the work they do so well.



Crozer Closing: Our Community Deserves Better

We remain devastated that, despite the efforts of many partners, a deal could not be reached to save the Crozer Health system. Healthcare in our community is in crisis, and we remain unwavering in our commitment to ensure access to quality healthcare, particularly in our most economically challenged communities. As part of our ongoing fight to protect access to essential healthcare services, The Foundation for Delaware County invested a \$20 million lifeline to keep hospitals open during negotiations. You will see that contribution reflected in our FY25 net assets number below. We know from the past decade the tremendous difference a community foundation can make in Delaware County, and we are committed to rebuilding for the future because we're Here for Good.

Financial Highlights

As of June 30, 2025, the Foundation's consolidated net assets totaled more than \$55M. The annual rate of return on investments is expected to be commensurate with the prevailing investment environment. The portfolio yielded a 10.48 percent return this year.

Investment Performance

The growth of the Foundation's assets comes from a combination of new contributions received and investment performance. The Foundation's Investment Sub-Committee, with the assistance of professional investment consultants PFM Asset Management LLC, is responsible for establishing the investment policy and continually monitoring the performance of the Foundation's investments.


